- With the development and evolution of newer digital printing processes, many now prefer the more descriptive term "archival pigment print."
- Both terms signify a high-resolution print with:
 - Accurate color reproduction.
 - Archival quality materials.
 - Fine detail capture.
- "Archival pigment print" is favored by some for its descriptive nature, reflecting the specific materials and processes involved.

3. Archival Pigment Prints and Digital Art:

- Archival pigment prints are a popular method for reproducing digital art.
- Digital artwork is created using computer software and printed onto archival paper using specialized inkjet printers.
- Key components include:
 - Archival pigment inks: Highly resistant to fading.
 - Archival paper: Acid-free and designed for longevity.
 - Digital art: Diverse forms created using computer software.

5. Fine Art Printing Paper Considerations:

- The choice of paper significantly impacts the final look and feel of an archival pigment print.
- Key considerations:
 - Archival Quality:
 - Acid-free paper is essential to prevent yellowing and deterioration.
 - The absence of optical brighteners (OBAs) is crucial, as OBAs can degrade and alter the print's color balance.
 - Surface Texture:
 - Personal preference plays a significant role.
 - Options range from smooth matte to glossy and textured surfaces.
 - Weight (GSM):
 - Heavier paper provides a more substantial and luxurious feel, as well as increased durability.
 - Color Reproduction:
 - The paper's coating affects ink absorption and color appearance.
 - Papers are designed to achieve accurate and vibrant color reproduction.
- Examples of Fine Art Printing Papers:
 - Hahnemühle Photo Rag Metallic (340gsm):
 - Combines the classic Photo Rag texture with a unique metallic sheen.
 - Effective for high-contrast images, metallic subjects, and abstract artwork.
 - Canson Infinity Baryta Photographique (310gsm):
 - A true baryta paper with a smooth, glossy finish, reminiscent of traditional darkroom prints.
 - Excellent for black and white photography and images requiring high detail.
 - Epson Ultra-Premium Presentation Paper Matte (192gsm):
 - A versatile matte paper offering excellent color reproduction and a smooth surface.
 - Suitable for a wide range of photographic and fine art prints.
 - Ilford Galerie Prestige Smooth Gloss (310gsm):
 - A high gloss paper, that yields vibrant colors, and deep blacks.
 - Great for photographic prints.
 - Moab Entrada Rag Bright 300 (300gsm):
 - A 100% cotton rag paper with a smooth, bright white surface.
 - Known for its exceptional archival properties and wide color gamut.

6. Archival Pigment Prints and Editions:

- Archival pigment prints offer artists the flexibility to create editions of their work, both limited and open.
- Limited Editions:
 - Consist of a predetermined number of prints, typically signed and numbered by the artist.
 - The limited number increases the collectability and value of the prints.
 - Artists often specify the edition size (e.g., 1/25, 2/25, etc.).
- Open Editions:
 - Do not have a predetermined number of prints.
 - Prints can be produced on an "as needed" basis, offering greater accessibility to the artwork.
- Printmaking Terminology:
 - The concept of editions is deeply rooted in traditional printmaking, where artists create multiple prints from a single matrix (e.g., a plate, stone, or screen).
 - Archival pigment prints allow for a similar process, with the digital file serving as the matrix.
- "As Needed" Printing:
 - The consistency of quality assured by modern printers and archival inks allows artists to print editions on demand, reducing the need for large print runs.
 - This offers greater control over inventory and reduces waste.
- Although less common, an artist could choose to create a single Archival Pigment Print, amending or deleting the digital file after printing. This would create a unique one of a kind print.
